L.G.ARMSTRONG

The Apostle Paul in writing to the church at Corinth recognized the essential oneness required in the Church. The Church born of the Christ, alive through the Holy Spirit had a single purpose to fulfil. Oneness, unity in witness was an essential quality for the fulfilling of that purpose. Paul wrote, "I now beseech you, brethren, by the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that ye speak the same thing, and that there be no divisions among you; but that ye be perfectly joined together in the same mind and in the same judgment." As in Paul's day so in our day. As in Corinth so in Brisbane. Let the oneness in our witness be the very strength of our fellowship. Let this be our theme as we move forward this year.

On reflection of past years we can see evidence of our oneness and the efforts we have made to widen our areas of influence. The past twelve months afforded us many opportunities and I would take this time to express appreciation to all who have co-operated in the years activities. I would make mention of the faithful support of Elders, Deacons and Auxiliary Leaders, of Organists and the Choir, the high standard maintained by our Presidents, Readers and Servers at the morning service. I would make mention of the work of both our Church Secretary and our Treasurer who are but two men constantly involved in responsible office. A particular appreciation to our Secretary Bro N. Watson who accepted Editorship of our church Messenger and has maintained a very high standard which is appreciated by all. The total programme of the Church calls for the co-operation of many, each Sunday Service involving approximately 25 persons in the preparation and presentation of the programme. Added to these are the many who by regular attendance, by words of encouragement and by the assurance of their prayer support have undergirded the ministry and life of the Church.

High lights of the year's activities have included my attendance at a Minister's Management Course conducted by L.I.F.E. and developing out of this a Church Planning Session in which all the Officers shared in October. It is out of this we are hoping will develop a new approach to church life. Earlier in the year several of our Members were involved in the Dr John Haggai Mission which gave added inspiration. The regular weekly Prayer and Bible Study Fellowship has now functioned for twelve months and has been an added blessing to those who have been able to participate as well as the many who have been upheld in prayer during crisis situations. Another highlight is the regular after church Coffee each Sunday evening. This has become a regular part of Ann Street life and does afford us the opportunity of informal fellowship and the chance to offer a little hospitality to our evening visitors. During the year a visit to Slaughter Falls for lunch together proved very successful. As this internal fellowship among members increases we note that it does begin to affect a wider group than the members, flowing over to friends, families and acquaintances. We encourage all to use such opportunities to extend the outreach of the Church.

My own programme has included Industrial Chaplaincy one morning per week; Lectureship at Kenmore 4 lectures per week, participation in the Institute of Clinical Pastoral Education as a group supervisor, Acting Secretary of the Preacher Placement and Advisory Board; Churches of Christ representative on C.T.A., QC. of A.C.C., I.T.I.M.,

The extension of Ann Street ministry to acceptance of Glen Eagles has widened the Ann St Service. Those sharing in the preaching have grown to appreciation of this new congregation, whilst the appreciation expressed by Glen Eagles residents of our services is heart warming and a reward in itself.

Both the occasions of marriages and deaths has presented me with openings for ministry and what little I have done has met with appreciation. Visitation of home, hospitals and nursing homes has also been continued giving me many opportunities for more personalized ministry. My participation in the C.Y.F. activities have been

of a more limited nature t is past twelve months as Bro. L. Vincenthas been able to act as the Adult Counselor.

Mention must be made of the Evening Services and inovations attempted. Over all these have added to the support and interest in the evening service. We do hope that this can be maintained and even improved. Innovations referred to would include the 'Open Pulpit' 'Auxiliary Nights' and a more regular use of films. I am very much aware of the need to maintain a vital witness of the Church and a continued outreach programme. Thus I appeal to the whole church to give metheir full support. Any ideas that members may have reagarding the services would be appreciated and considered for inclusion

I conclude by expressing my appreciation to all who have given their support to the work. In particular to my wife and family who have co-operated fully giving me the home backing one so much needs. May we maintain our witness, our unity and the rich fellowship we have enjoyed in Christ. May 1975 be a profitable year for the Kingdom of God, the Church of Christ at Ann Street and to each one of you.

TREASURER'S REPORT

It is pleasing to report that 1974 was a much better year than 1973.
Comments are -

Offerings

General Offerings increased by \$217 - 19% increase
Budget Offerings increased by \$2481 - 26% increase.

Because of the increased offerings we were able to increase our allocation to Brotherhood Committees to 25% of Budget offerings - in 1973 we reluctantly reduced the allocation to 20% for three-quarters of the year.

We had increased expenses notably Minister's Salary and Car Allowance which increased by 12½%. The only other notable increase was in Other Expenses which increased by \$446 - mainly Hymn Books \$375 and Hymn Books for Glen Eagles \$45 (this is included in Sundry amounts).

I mention that Insurance which normally should have been paid in 1974 was not paid - this cost \$337 paid in February.

Actual General Funds at call at 31.12.74 were bank balance \$516 and Social Service Debentures \$1600.

Advance to Minister to Purchase Car - An advance of \$1850 was made. This is repayable at \$15 per week and will be repaid by March 1977. Interest is payable at 5% at monthly rests and will amount to \$123.

New Guinea Pastor - Offerings were \$1147 - an increase of 76% over 1973. Other receipts (listed in the Statement) were \$179. The fund was overdrawn at the beginning of the year by \$22 and so \$1304 was remitted to the Federal Board as our contribution towards the upkeep of Bill and Janet Buli. Our contribution for 1973 was \$708.

CHURCH SECRETARY'S REPORT

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During the year there were two (2) young people added to active membership by faith and baptism. There were twenty-one other additions to active membership - fourteen (14) transfers from other churches of Christ and seven (7) from isolated and supplementary rolls. There were six (6) transferred out to other churches of Christ and seven (7) other losses by revision of roll, as well as three (3) losses by death - two from active membership and one from supplementary roll. Active membership at the end of the year was 142 - an increase of 8 on last year's figure.

Attendances at morning services averaged 131 (135 last year), whilst an average of 67 (64 last year) attended the gospel services. Communicants at the Lord's Table averaged 108 (112 last year).

We pay tribute to the late Mrs. Larsen, Mrs. Warne and Mrs. White who were called to higher service during the year. We give thanks for every remembrance of them and the contributions which they made in the work and witness of the church, and the enrichment of our fellowship.

The Board of Officers met regularly each month except in January.

The programmed activities for the year were co-ordinated by the Council of Auxiliaries. The annual Family Camp was held at 'Camp Cal.' March 22/24. This is an important activity in the life of the church. On April 25 there was an 'At Home' at the residence of Mr. and Mrs. A. C. Male. The Men's Fellowship organised a Car Rally to Slaughter Falls on June 22. The church/Bible School anniversary services were held on September 22 and 29. Guest speaker at the morning service on Sept. 22 was Rev. Neville Abrahams of the City Baptist Tabernacle. The church/Bible School annual picnic was held at Bunyaville on October 5. On November 9 a Spring Festival organised by the Women's Fellowship provided an enjoyable evening's entertainment. The closing function for the year was the Christmas party held on December 7. The church was appreciative of the night of sacred music and song organised for November 15 when an excellent programme was presented to an **audience too large** for our chapel to accommodate.

On October 11/12 the Elders and Deacons shared in a planning seminar the outcome of which was the establishment of four working sub-committees each under the leadership of one of the Elders. These sub-committees will concentrate their attention and efforts on -

- (a) Discipleship Development.
- (b) Strengthening of spiritual life.
- (c) Evangelism.
- (d) Community concern.

The monthly Family Fellowship meetings, combined with fellowship tea, continue as a vital part of the work of the church, even though attendances may perhaps be not quite so high. We are indebted to Sis. Mrs. W. S. Hoens and her helpers (usually Mrs. L. Fox and Mrs. M. Taylor) for the preparation of excellent meals throughout the year, at a reasonable cost. This involves quite a deal of effort and many hours of work both at home and at the social hall in the kitchen.

Spiritual oversight at "Gleneagles" continues. A worship service is conducted each Sunday morning at 11 a.m. We acknowledge the help of the speakers - Bren. L. G. Armstrong, W. H. Law, H. Risson, R. H. Proud and J. H. Smith, as well as Bro. Ray Coats prior to his return to New Zealand in December.

Items of business to be dealt with at this year's annual general business meeting will include the appointment of a Planning/Organising Committee for Family Fellowship and consideration of two recommendations from the Board of Officers relative to increasing our financial support of Bill Buli from \$59 to \$95 per month, and alteration of the time of our Sunday night service to 7 p.m. throughout the year rather than commencing at 7.30 p.m. for the months of September to April, and at 6.30 p.m. for the months of May to August as has been the practice for the past two years.

"Thank you sincerely" to all who have assisted in so many and varied ways in the activities and life of the church during the past year - ways and individuals too numerous to mention. With Paul, when he wrote to the church at Corinth, I would say - "And so, brothers of mine, stand firm! Let nothing move you as you busy yourselves in the Lord's work. Be sure that nothing you do for Him is ever lost or ever wasted." (1 Cor. 15:58 - J. B. Phillips translation).

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The Women's Fellowship takes very much pleasure in presenting this report for 1974.

The President for this year was Mrs. Julie Flood who was one of our youngest Presidents and proved herself a very capable leader. One of her aims was "OUTREACH", and an innovation into our syllabus was that we had three of our meetings in members' homes, inviting neighbours and friends to these meetings.

We have 36 active members on the roll, with an average attendance of 22. We meet on the first and third Thursdays of each month.

At the instigation of our President our meetings were varied somewhat; we visited the Shaftesbury Centre where Mr. Male gave us an informative talk on the work of the Centre and showed a film; we had two work days - one to make goods for "Burdeu House" Garden Party, and the other to wrap goods for hospital visitation; we made a tape of a play and sent it to the Women's Fellowship at Avenell Heights, Bundaberg, and they in turn sent one back to us. This is designed to make country and town fellowships feel more at home one with the other.

The Women's Fellowship conducted two of the Sunday night services during the year. We deemed this quite an honour, and a fulfilling experience.

We were responsible for a "Fashion Parade" in which all auxiliaries of the church participated.

We held two lamington drives from which we raised \$173.99. Not only are these drives good money-makers, but we have wonderful fellowship together as we work.

We continued with the "sunshine bags" on a voluntary basis and from these we collected \$54.55. Quite a number of our women contributed to a scheme to raise funds for a nursing wing at the Golden Age Retirement Village, Southport.

For our Mothers' Day meeting we again invited the ladies from "Burdeu House" to morning tea and a Mothers' Day programme. We call for and return them back to the home. They really appreciate this gesture. We also held a Christmas meeting with them. Mrs. Potter and her helpers continued with their fortnightly visits to "Burdeu House", the objective being to try to keep the ladies occupied with their minds and hands. This is allpart of our 'outreach' work.

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BIBLE SCHOOL REPORT

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Once again I am able to report that the number and names of the pupils in the school show little change from previous years. This fact alone is of concern but coupled with the year's average weekly attendance of 68% of pupils, most of whom are children of church members, the problem must be of concern to all members of the church.

I realize that statistics never tell the whole story, but they cannot be ignored, as the fact remains that almost one third of the children are absent each week. This means that they miss this opportunity of becoming better acquainted with the Lord. I also realize that the greatest influence on the children, in forming their attitudes and behaviour in their relationship with God, is exerted in the home. This does not lessen the degree of responsibility placed on the staff of the school, but means simply that the two are used to complement each other. This is necessary if we wish to find a mature and positive outlook in the lives of the children.

In order to ensure a well balanced life it is necessary that the children have a variety of activities. Such events during the year included the annual picnic at Bunyaville and the Christmas social. The children also participated in the evening service for the anniversary in September. The three-way meet was disappointing due to waning interest on the part of the other two schools. We had the best attendance.

Whilst our numbers may be small, the children invariably give wholehearted support to the projects that we undertake for the benefit of others. One such project was the 'Camp Cal.' Piano Fund which realized \$58.

One section of the school that runs very efficiently, but goes almost unnoticed, is the cradle roll under the care of Mrs. S. Vincent. Her work is greatly appreciated by the parents of the infants concerned.

We have been sorry to lose the services this year of Mesdames N. Woodward and B. Smith, and Miss C. Henderson, and we thank them sincerely for their efforts in past years. We are pleased, however, to welcome to the staff Mrs. R. Heywood and Miss F. Hobbs, and trust that our task together this year will bring glory to the name of our Saviour.

I take this opportunity to thank all who have contributed to the work in prayer, by donations and willing effort, and trust that you may continue to give that support as together we embark on this new year placing our faith and trust in the Lord in whom all things are possible.
