# MINISTER'S REPORT

It has been my real privilege to be considered worthy to minister here with you in the presence and name of Jesus. Nothing that I am or will ever be, nothing that I do or will ever do, will be a response adequate for what He has done for me. grateful that through His grace He has used me and begun to bless you His people, far more than we ever do, or ever will deserve,

I personally commend all those who with determination, faithfulness and dedication worked hard to continue the work of the ministry during the absence of a resident Pastor. The true reward is not yet given here where it would fade and perish; it is far grander than that!

My task now over these five years is not for you to give, or for me to decide; it has been given in the Word of God:

"His gifts were that some should be Apostles, some Prophets, some Evangelists, some Pastors and Teachers, for the equipment of the saints for the work of ministry ... " Ephesians 4: 11,12.

My task is not to do the work of ministry, but to bring you to a point where you do the work of ministry. This charter I have commenced in three areas.

- (1) THE ELDERSHIP. I am quietly delighted that our Elders have resumed their monthly meetings, and we meet to pray, plan for our church, and share the ministry together. I respect their combined experience, wisdom and insight tremendously, and I look to them to continually interpret the pulse of our church family. Together we have looked at the real needs of our church and with their guidance I commenced the second area where I work to equip you for the work of ministry, and after consultation we unanimously set the third area.
  - I have always considered the Eldership to be the key to any church. If an Eldership cannot actively minister in mutual trust, diligence, consistancy, prayerfulness and harmony within the power of God, it is useless expecting anybody else in the church to. As I come to work with my four men here, they are still the key, and I thank God for them and ask that you build them up in prayer for their immense responsibility.
- SUNDAY MORNING SERVICE STUDY. After discussion with the Elders I commenced (2)"We are the Body of Christ" - a study that will continue through the year on the New Testament book of Acts. From your response I can see that the Lord is saying a great deal to us about our life and ministry as Christians. I am also particularly pleased that steps are being initiated to enable Bible School teachers to hear this teaching, along with those sick, absent, or unable to attend.
- (3) MID-WEEK STUDY. As the Eldership looked at the question of Bible Study in the church we decided unanimously to commence a new, 12 weeks' study -"Body Life". As a result some five groups of ten people are meeting, one nearly every night of the week. Central to the study is the development of the Christian life, so that all those who have registered may be more ably equipped to minister. I expect that as always in the history of the Christian Church, those that meet in small groups for prayer, fellowship and study, will grow and mature far more quickly than those who don't.

As we enter further into our first year together, I am thankful for your openness to be equipped for the work of ministry, the warmth of your welcome, your preparation of the manse, and your acceptance and hospitality to us as a family. As I wrote in 1977:

> "I believe that God has a great vision for Ann Street that He is going to unveil, and I look forward to being part of it immensely."

## CHURCH SECRETARY'S REPORT

During the year there were six (6) added to active membership by faith and baptism.

There were six (6) other additions by transfers from other Churches of Christ. There were two (2) deaths. This resulted in a total active membership as at December 31, 1978, of 133.

Attendances at the morning services averaged 123 (113 last year), whilst an average of 68 (59 last year) attended the gospel services. Communicants averaged 110 (100 last year). These marked increases were an indication of the tone of the work in general.

The church suffered a very deep loss by the passing of Bro. C. G. Flood on September 10 following an interim ministry which he shared with us through to the end of July when a worsening heart condition prevented his continuing. Never shall we forget the strength which flowed from the enlightenment he was used of God to give through the guidance of the Holy Spirit, as he fed upon the Word of God. A further loss was suffered by the passing of our sister Mrs. J. Auld on November 28. We give thanks for every remembrance of each o them. With their loved ones we have shared their sorrow, and as we remember all who have gone on before to be with Christ, we share the glorious hope of the resurrection and the grand reunion when we shall all meet our Saviour when He comes in all His glory to take us all to be with Him forever.

We acknowledge with a deep sense of gratitude the ministry of guest preachers who shared with us - Bren. Roger Risson, F. Beale, Dr. David Hammer, J. Anderson, Dr. P. G. Jauncey, V. T. Parker, Chaplain R. V. Holt, Lyall Muller, Bruce Roberts, A. C. Male, E. T. Hart, A. G. Leane, "The Flying Squad" from Kenmore Christian College, and Miss Aileen Draney.

At the beginning of December we welcomed into our fellowship our Bro. and Sis. Ron White and Miriam, and the ministry of Bro. White is already having an influence on the life of the church with the emphasis being upon our individual spiritual development and growth in Christ. The commencement of this ministry came after our being without a full-time minister for over two years which was a difficult period. Nevertheless the work of the church was maintained and the loyal support of all was greatly appreciated.

Upon the completion of the "Report of findings of survey conducted into the role of the Ann Street Church of Christ", copies were made available to those who desired them, and a copy was forwarded to Mr. White before his arrival. Although only 35% of the questionnaires distributed were returned, the results confirmed many of the insights that were in the minds of the Elders and Officers. As a result of the survey, Mr. White, while still in Hamilton, could begin to see the sort of ministry that was needed, and with this report before him he first considered 'Body Life' as a place to commence. Not wanting to assume the results of 'Body Life', Mr. White, the Elders and Officers will again look at further directions at the conclusion of that study. We thank the committee for their exhaustive work and great deal of care.

Our chard and facilities have been made available for the Annual State Conference sessions and other brotherhood and external requirements.

Extensive improvements were essential at the manse to prepare it for the coming of Mr. and Mrs. White and Miriam. Cur treasurer has referred in his report to the costs involved. There was a considerable amount of voluntary labour supplied, and we are indebted to all who shared in that manner.

Spiritual oversight at "Gleneagles" continued throughout the year. A worship service was conducted each Sunday norming at 11 a.m., except during the Christmas/New Year periods. We are grateful to the panel of speakers responsible for maintaining these services - Bren. F. Olsen, H. J. Plint and R. H. Proud, assisted for part of the year by Bren. W. H. Law and H. Risson. We are appreciative of the assistance given by Bro. E. W. Potter as pianist and those who help in the preparation of the meeting room.

Programmed activities were maintained during the year; each auxiliary has been requested to submit suggestions for the 1979 programme. It is pleasing to note that plans are well in hand for restoration of the annual church family camp.

It is proposed that a review of our financial support of Bill Buli, our New Guinea Pastor, be made at the annual general business meeting of the church, to which this report is presented.

The Officers have taken steps towards investigating possibilities regarding the time at which our Bible School meets each Sunday.

General Offerings increased by \$213 - 9.2% over 1977. Budget Offerings increased by \$3356 - 21.8% over 1977.

#### NEW GUINEA PASTOR.

At the last annual meeting it was agreed to increase our support from \$95 per month to \$156.67 per month. Our payments to the Overseas Mission Board totalled \$2007 (2 months at \$95; 10 months at \$156.67; a special payment of \$250). Receipts totalled \$1743. Funds in hand at the end of 1978 were \$482 compared with \$746 at the end of 1977.

#### KOREAN PASTOR.

Offerings totalled \$367. We forwarded \$438 to the Overseas Mission Board. This included \$150 as a special contribution towards Pastor Kong's medical expenses. Funds in hand at the end of 1978 were \$61 compared with \$132 at the end of 1977.
